Reading Response Roundup

- 1. Write about something that surprised you or that you found interesting in your reading this week.
- 2. Explain what you like or dislike about the book and why you feel that way.
- 3. Describe an interesting or important character in your book.
- 4. Explain parts of the book that puzzled you or made you ask questions about your reading.
- 5. Explain what the story means to you.
- 6. Discuss your thoughts and feelings about the author's message or the theme of the story.
- 7. Explain what you noticed about one of the characters, such as what made them act as they did or how they changed through the story.
- 8. Discuss why you think the author chose the title.
- 9. As you read, make some predictions and discuss whether they were right or totally off base.
- 10. How does the information in the book fit in with what you already know? Is it an area of interest for you, or is it new information? (for nonfiction books)
- 11. Explain how the book reminds you of yourself or people you know or of something that happened in your life. Make a text-to-self or text-to-world connection.
- 12. How is the book like other books by the same author, on the same topic, or in the same genre?
- 13. Explain how the book reminds you of other books, especially the characters, events, or setting.
 Make a text-to-text connection.
- 14. Discuss how the illustrations add meaning to the story (if there are illustrations).
- 15. Discuss the ending of your book and your feelings about it.
- 16. Discuss the language the author used and what you thought about it.
- 17. Discuss the author's craft. What was good about the author's writing?
- 18. Explain why you chose to read this book. What made you want to read it?
- 19. Discuss why you think the author wrote the book.
- 20. Would you recommend the book to another reader? Why or why not?
- 21. What you would change about the book? Why or how would you change it?
- 22. Give some examples of stereotypes or biases from your book.
- 23. Tell whether the book is easy, just right, or too challenging for you and how you know.
